The Village Square is the focal point of the small Kentish community of Lenham, and over the years the buildings have been home to a wide variety of businesses, including pubs, bakers, post office, butchers, antique shops, grocers and wine merchants to name just a few. These postcards show the Square at the start of the 20th century, where cars were rarely seen, and children could safely play in the streets with just horses and carts for company. Children pose outside the Dog and Bear public house, which was a coaching inn since the turnpike road was constructed in 1780. The Lime trees are in full bloom outside the row of shops fronted by the cobbled walk.



Another view of the square with an early motor car parked outside the Dog and Bear, the lime trees again an impressive sight on this card dated 1926.



The Chequers Inn on a card c 1910 prior to it becoming a tea-room, with Mr A Palmer's shop trading as a Saddler and Harness Maker by the Limes.



The Limes, the beautiful cobbled and lime-shaded pathway on one side of the Square. The huge old trees have since been replaced by younger trees, but still provide a shady walk for the shoppers. Henry Burton's butchers' shop is nearest to the camera, and a horse and trap await their owner.

Ma Brown stands beside the door of her tea-shop in Church Square with her children Edward and Dorothy. She was in business from the 1920's to the 1930's.

LEAD THE WAY DOG TRAINING Wednesday evenings

We run Puppy training classes following the Kennel Club Puppy Foundation Course, after which you can continue with us and gain the KC Bronze, Silver and Gold awards. We are also experienced with rescue dogs too.

The trainers are Janet Tandy, who is a Kennel Club Accredited Instructor, City & Guilds and affiliated to the British Institute of Professional Dog Trainers, and Marion Street who is a very experienced dog trainer having a lot of understanding of rescue dogs. Together we run very popular dog training classes throughout the evening.

Many of the dogs have gone on to become Cynophobia dogs helping the children overcome their fear.

KENT CYNOPHOBIA ASSISTANCE GROUP

Monday evenings at 5.30

Cynophobia is a Greek word, <u>Cyno</u> is dog, Phobia is fear, so it simply means the 'fear of dogs' We are now in our 7th year, having helped so many children overcome their fear of dogs. We have 12 dogs on our list, we have a rota of seven dogs each Monday, helping on average each week 18 children.

Our success rate is that 90% of children stroke a dog within the first hourly session, often to the amazement of parents. These children having had a lot of encouragement to even get out of their car.

Over the seven years, we are proud to say that we have changed so many families lives for the better. We are all volunteers and it is a free group, we only ask for donations of sweets. We are always on the lookout for nice dogs for assessment, and even if you do not have a suitable dog we always need helpers just for an hour.

We have our own Facebook page 'Kent Cynophobia Assistance Group'.

The scheme is available to people who live in Kingswood, Broomfield, Langley, East Sutton, Chart Sutton and Sutton Valence – and to patients of the Orchard Surgery in Langley and Sutton Valence Surgery.

The Village Hall Committee were pleased to allow the Poppy Cascade group use of the hall, free of charge, to enable people to contribute and work on the display which will be up for day of remembrance.

Meanwhile we are planning, with the Parish Council, to hold a drop in coffee morning in the hall at 10.30am to 12.30pm on Tuesday 20th December 2022, Thursday 16th February 2023 and Thursday 13th April 2023. These dates are during the holidays when Pre-School is not running in the hall.

Please can we make an appeal to all users of the hall to be aware of their gas and electricity usage. We are all aware of the rising costs of energy and making adjustments at home but the hall is also facing rising bills and we would hate to be in the position of some other village halls and have to consider closing the hall during the winter months. So please let's all do the best we can to keep the bills down.

Kingswood Community Speedwatch – We need some additional help from you!

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where, in partnership with the police, members of communities use detection devices **to monitor local vehicle speeds**. The volunteers report drivers exceeding the speed limit to the police with the aim of educating drivers to slow down.

If the data proves a driver is ignoring repeated warnings police can prosecute them. The aim is to:

- reduce death and injury on the roads
- improve the quality of life for local communities
- reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit

increase public awareness of inappropriate speed



Kingswood Community Speedwatch was set up around 8 months ago and is a volunteer group run by members of the local community

We are a friendly bunch with an aim to reduce the number of cars speeding through our village and to protect our local community from serious accidents. We do rarely experience some negative behaviour towards us which is taken very seriously by Kent Police. We do wear a body camera to record all our speedwatch sessions and can and will report drivers that are unnecessarily aggressive towards the group members. We are all local residents trying to encourage a safer environment for all of the community.

Since we started in February 2022, the following numbers of vehicles have passed through our village, and the following number of letters issued to speeding vehicles.

Total number of sessions - 92

Total volunteer hours - 220

Number of vehicles observed - 9670

Number of vehicles reported to the police and letters issued - 406

Number of vehicles exceeding the limit more than once - 29

The highest speeder to date recorded at 49mph in a 30 zone!

It's also important to advise vehicle users that if a vehicle is recorded by any group in Kent and logged onto the system, and then is caught by another speedwatch group that will be recorded as an additional incident. Where these rack up, points do not make prizes, they make for letters hand delivered by the police and possible prosecution.

In the main, as a group we have noticed cars slowing down around the village so hopefully the number of speeders will reduce over time.

As with all volunteer groups, we could always do with more help! The more of us then the lighter the load for us all. If you could spare even an hour a month we would really love to have you in the group. All of the current members in the group all have work and commitments that we schedule sessions around, which means they occur on different days and times each week

Training is required and provided by Kent Police. It involves some online training that takes approx. 30-45 mins to complete and is really easy to follow and then some roadside training to learn how to use the camera and record data effectively.

It's a lovely way to meet other members of the community and to create a safer environment across Kingswoods roads.

"ACORNS GALORE"

This Autumn we saw a proliferation of acorns in our local area. A very good crop of acorns only occurs approximately every 5-10 years, called 'mast' years from the Scandinavian word 'mat' (meaning food). They are welcome food for squirrels, wood mice, pheasants, wood pigeons and jays. Jays regularly carry acorns to open ground and bury them. When they forget where they have buried them and if nothing else finds them, a sapling may grow. Pigs find acorns very tasty.

An Oak tree can produce approximately 2,000 acorns most years.But only one in one hundred thousand acorns is likely to grow into a fully-grown specimen .Oaks do not produce acorns until they are about ten years old.

Acorns and Oak leaves contain Tannin which is poisonous to horses and cattle. They can be toxic to dogs if they digest them. Please remember to keep an eye on your dogs when out walking.

Acorns have a number of health benefits to humans e.g. acorn coffee, which durning WW2 was a substitute for real coffee (it is an acquired taste). Apparently, the benefits are to control blood sugar, digestion, energy and skin care. There is also acorn flour, which goes back 10.000 years.

If you should decide to produce any of the above always discard the green ones, also the ones with a little hole in the shell, which is infected by the larvae of the oak weevil. The weevil bore their holes like an alien from inside of the acorn. Moth larvae can also be in the acorn. Only use brown acorns . The Tannin must always be removed by blanching. It would be interesting to know if anyone has produced coffee or flour from acorns.

The Kingswood Community Poppy Display

Our Poppy display symbolises the respect and remembrance of our community for the sacrifices for our freedoms made by the armed forces in conflicts.

We also remember the animals lost in conflicts with purple poppies and we used white poppies to show our hope for peace.

We started work in August in the drought and we finished in November in a deluge. The display includes more than 50 stones painted by our young people, over 1000 plastic bottle poppies made by our children in schools and youth groups and over 1500 knitted, crochet, and sewn poppies made by crafters in Kingswood and the surrounding areas.

Remembering the sacrifices of others has brought our community together in the difficult times we face now.

These members of our community gave their time, ideas, suggestions, effort and enthusiasm as part of the Project Team. Winter Draws On by Cllr Malcolm Clarke

We're at that time of year again! After a summer that was far too hot for many, we now begin the decline into Winter. Let's hope that it won't be too cold, and, just to cheer us all up, we are now faced with the added trials of possible power cuts and higher costs for food and energy. What can we do to minimise these problems?

Let's not panic or become anxious about what this winter will bring. If we take some simple preparations, we'll keep cosy and warm.

There are four important points to remember to help get through a cold winter.

Stay warm and cosy – NEVER sacrifice warmth to save money.

Stay well fed – ensure that you don't go hungry.

Be prepared for power outages and keep an Emergency Kit for use when the power goes.

Be in contact with others – Make sure you know how your friends and neighbours are managing. Don't be afraid to talk to people or ask for help. It is always easier to manage when you're not alone. You don't have to be alone.

Many of us will be especially worried about the rising cost of fuel. How can we keep these costs to a minimum?

In the first instance, if you have trouble affording the extra costs, contact your fuel supplier and discuss what can be done. It is in their interests to give support to their customers. Never be afraid to talk to them, they may well be able to suggest ways of coping but remember, NEVER sacrifice your warmth and comfort to save money.

- Keep one room warm and reduce temperatures in other unused rooms by a degree or so using the radiator thermostats. Keep doors shut so heating is maintained in each room. Wear a warm wristband and thick socks, if possible, buy some handwarmers that can be filled with hot water. It is important to keep your extremities warm. Keep your head warm. Wear layers of clothes.
- Don't let the house get too cold. Never turn the heating fully off. A minimum temperature of at least 6 Degrees C is required to make sure that the water pipes don't freeze in really bad conditions. However, a temperature of around 20 degrees should be maintained if possible.

Stop draughts at the bottom of doors by placing a towel or rug against them.

Buy (or make) nourishing food which requires short cooking times e.g., thick soups and stews.

Make sure that you have adequate clothing to deal with cold spells.

- Keep in contact with others around you. You may decide to share your house with friends and neighbours. You could provide the heating whilst another provides the food and then swap your share on a rota. If you have a small group of friends or acquaintances this will have the added benefit of reducing heating costs as well as sharing company.
- If in trouble, FOR ANY REASON, call someone. Don't be afraid to ask and most people are only too willing to help if they can. Make sure that you have your mobile charged in case of power cuts so that you can make calls.
- Power cuts will be programmed so be ready, boil the kettle and fill a thermos flask to make hot drinks later. Fill a hot water bottle to help keep warm. Make sure you know where everything you might need is.

Emergency Kit for use in Power cuts

Essential Items

Torch and spare batteries

Hot water bottle.

Small propane gas stove and gas cylinders (Could be a very good investment)

List of important telephone numbers

A stock of tinned meals and thick soups or a supply of prepared soups and stews)

Some dried noodles (quick and easy to cook)

Candles & matches

Thermos flask

Nice to have items:

Small stove top kettle. Plug in telephone Bundle of Solar Powered LED Garden lights (£10 - £15 Amazon) Double GAZ burner stove and gas cylinders (£30 -£50 Amazon)

Please remember, there is a wealth of information on the internet about available help with costs etc., especially from your local council websites. Use these if possible and don't be afraid to ask.

This note cannot be considered a full list of what you can do but it can give you an idea of some of the things that you can try.

The most important message is to be prepared and communicate.

Included in your annual ticket is our daytime offer, Christmas at the Castle. There are a number of different experiences. Firstly, the Castle will be decorated in its usual luxurious style, but with a twist, we are preparing the Castle for one of Lady Baillie's Christmases. Prepare to be dazzled by the glamour and seasonal splendour!

In the wider estate, there will be an activity trail to find candy canes and lollipops, a giant sleigh up at the Maze area for your family selfie (do share on social media) and a seasonally themed challenge in the Maze itself.
