



It can cause upsets, sore throats, asthmas and even blindness.

Due to ill health over the last few months, regrettably Peter Brown has had to stand down as leader of the Group and has "promoted" myself to now lead the way.


Our members thank Peter for his energy, enthusiasm and foresight over the years, putting together and maintaining the group as we know it today.

Shukokai Karate Academy Kingswood Karate Club

Kingswood Karate Club, which is based in the village hall, continues to go from strength to strength. The club is now part of the Shukokai Karate Academy (SKA), a new organisation affiliated to the English Karate Federation (EKF) and World Karate Federation (WKF), and which was formed by Joint Chief Instructors Chris and Katie Simpson, both from the village, in October 2018.

In November 2018 the club held its annual championships, which were supported by nearly 100 students from the village and surrounding areas. The competition involved both individual kumite (fighting) and kata

(forms) events, as well as team events in both disciplines. The teams consisted of children of different age groups and clubs, which encouraged students who had never worked together, to be part of the same team.

Sensei Chris (refereeing) and Sensei Katie (coaching) attended a training course in December with Sensei Chris passing the first part of his referee's exam and Sensei Katie gaining her EKF Coaches accreditation.

A senior grade grading took place in December, for those attempting to gain promotion to brown belt. This grade is only realistically attempted after a student has been training for upwards of 3 years with the club and is a very tough examination taking place over a two-hour period. The club then held a fundraising Christmas party in the village hall, which was well attended by a large number of the younger students. Also in December, one of the club's long-standing students Steve Pereira opened the SKA's first new club in Sutton Valence village hall, giving students another opportunity to train during the week.

Students hit the ground running from the beginning of 2019 with thirty-four members of the club attending their first big external tournament, namely the National Kyu grades competition, in Leicester. This competition, for all those below black belt, attracted over 1,100 competitors from all over the country and the club was pleased that Marie Worton and Joseph Wood, both from the Kingswood club, won silver in their respective events. This was the first event that students had attended where the rules of the WKF were operated and overall it was a great experience for everyone. Sensei Chris, as part of his training to become a fully qualified EKF qualified referee spent all day refereeing different categories at the tournament. The club were very fortunate to receive sponsorship from Medway Building Supplies which enabled all students attending this event to have a new club tracksuit.

In early January the club was visited by Sensei Alton Brown, a long-standing friend of the SKA who is hoping to compete at the 2020 Olympics in Japan. Sensei Alton ran an intensive training course at The Cornwallis Academy and gave an insight into some new sparring techniques and drills.

In February the club had nine members in attendance at the UK Karate Open Championships in Birmingham returning with 2 Gold, 2 Silver and 2 Bronze medals. Sensei Katie also attended the EKF National Kata squad open training session and Luke Carpenter gained his EKF Coaches accreditation.

To supplement their own teaching, Sensei Chris and Sensei Katie intend to continue to invite different coaches from around the country to run seminars at the SKA as they see this as a way for all students to obtain a broad training in the martial art.

It is also hoped that members of the club will be able to participate in an international competition later in the year and fundraising events will be taking place to help defray some of the costs involved.

The club runs classes for students age 4 upwards on Tuesday evenings at the Kingswood village hall and beginners are always welcome. They also run clubs at Lenham, Downswood, Maidstone YMCA, Marden and Sutton Valence. Anyone interested in coming along for a free trial lesson,

What is The Three Suttons Helpline?

The Three Suttons Helpline has been operating as a "good neighbour" scheme for about 20 years to make life easier for those needing to get to medical appointments, but who do not have their own transport or cannot easily be helped by family or friends and for whom public transport is infrequent and not a viable option. This scheme now arranges and gives over 400 lifts a year and covers the villages and surgeries in Sutton Valence, Chart Sutton, East Sutton, Kingswood and Langley.

The Helpline is operated entirely by volunteers who are not paid for their work: the three ladies who answer telephone requests and arrange the journeys and the 20 volunteer drivers. Donations from the users of the scheme pay towards telephone calls and petrol costs. A number of the local parish councils and a local charity have kindly donated money which goes towards insurance, publicity and other costs.

Life is often a mixture of joy and sadness and we have recently experienced both at Kingswood Church.

Joy in the appointment of **Rev Mark Pavey** to be our Team Vicar starting on 14th March. There is a message from Mark elsewhere in this edition of the Parish News and we look forward to welcoming Mark to Kingswood Church after Easter.

Sadness with the passing of **Rev Steve Hughes** who was our Team Vicar until August last year when he retired to move to North Wales with his wife Mandy. There was a celebration of the life of Steve at Langley Church on Wednesday 27th February where a packed church heard tributes from the Bishop of Dover and the Archdeacon of Maidstone.

We heard how Steve and Mandy travelled to Romania with a convoy of aid in 1990, when the economy of the country was suffering, and moved there the following year with the family to help those in poverty. He was a man who was sincere, compassionate and down to earth and put his faith into action.

Steve was well loved at Kingswood Church; we enjoyed his informal approach, and are thankful to God for the time he was with us. He will be sorely missed and we send our love and condolences to Mandy and the family at this time.

Hi,

This is the first of what I hope will be many parish magazine articles. I thought it would be

appropriate to introduce myself and the family to you but before I do that, I'd love to ask you what your hopes are regarding a new vicar? I wonder what hope, that comes with a new vicar, looks like for





churches? For those in our churches, I suppose the hopes are that the churches will be welcoming new people of all ages and increase a sense of community. But I wonder what the hopes are for those who are not yet connected to the churches? It's quite possible they have no hopes at all because ultimately the Christian faith may be seen as irrelevant or the churches as intimidating places to visit for various

Regardless of the reasons and regardless of whether one attends church or not, I'd like to fill you with hope. First of all, hope is different to expectation particularly as expectation tends to be shaped by past experiences, but I'd like you to give me a chance to show you, whoever you are, that you should be hopeful. The Christian faith centres on good news for everyone. It celebrates and worships a God who refuses to give up on humanity, whether that's helping individuals overcome vices, or guilt. Whether it's rebuilding communities or families that have previously been fractured, whether it's supporting people who are facing illnesses or mourning loved ones.

This is what the churches should be about, they should be hubs of hope, they should be places where we can go to explore and wrestle with faith with the possibility of meeting with a God that surpasses all our expectations. That is my hope, that the churches will be centres where people can come to explore faith, to worship freely, and receive the love and support of a God who wants to be in a relationship with each of us.

My family and I are looking forward to being part of these types of churches. I'm married to Tansye and have two amazing girls who were both playing drums and singing in my previous church last Sunday. Time with my family is hugely important to me and we're all looking forward to the adventures ahead in our new churches.

To paint a picture of me. I taught myself guitar and a bit of piano and sing with a local function band, my latest quest is to teach myself sign language although I'm at very early stages at the moment. I'm big fan of football (particularly Liverpool FC) although please don't let that put you off! I also enjoy reading and playing a bit of golf. Before being ordained I worked as lay chaplain with young offenders supporting staff, families and the young offenders themselves. Prior to this I worked with a charity delivering Christian youth work, and working with various secondary schools around Maidstone and before this I was in marketing. Clearly, this is merely a snapshot of who I am, but I hope that through the church and/or work in the community I will get to meet you soon.

It would be great to see you at any of the churches and I'm sure there will be a warm welcome awaiting you.

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

PEOPLE AND PLACES IN PROFILE

A glimpse into Len Valley Lives and Locations

So successful was the eighteenth-century papermaking enterprise of James Whatman the Younger, he felt confident to commission celebrated landscape architect Humpry Repton to re-design Vinters Park, his imposing new estate near Maidstone. The Park comprised some eight-five acres; James' ambitious purchase was intended to reflect the importance of the Whatman name in the production of paper in Britain and beyond.

But the origins were humble: James Whatman's father (also James) was born in 1702, the son of a tanner in the valley head village of Loose. The River Loose which runs through the village supported a thriving papermaking industry during James the Elder's early years. His childhood friend Richard Harris was the son of a local papermaker, and it is possibly from this association that James first learnt his craft.

James and Richard remained firm friends, eventually becoming business partners. They emerge in records during the 1730's in a complicated arrangement of indentures and leases on land in the parishes of Leeds and Hollingbourne. Around this time the Wealden cloth-making industry was in decline, causing many of the fulling mills along the River Len (used for a cleansing method in the thickening of wool fibres) to be converted into paper mills. The two young men saw this as a golden opportunity to advance their business aspirations.

It was in 1733 that James Whatman secured his first lease on Old Mill between Leeds and Hollingbourne; he re-built the existing mill and promptly sub-let to Richard Harris. Harris spent the next three years producing paper at Old Mill, before acquiring the tenancy of Turkey Mill on the River Len at Boxley. On becoming sole owner of this mill in 1738 he embarked on an extensive rebuild.

"All that now built messuage wherein I now dwell, and also the buildings now intended for a paper mill where the old mill was, which was called Turkey Mill..." so ran the wording in the Will of Richard Harris bequeathing his entire estate to his wife Anne. She inherited on his early death in 1739. But tragedy it seems provided opportunity, as whether for love or financial advantage, James married Richard's widow within a year. Their subsequent move into the adjoining seventeenth century house, Turkey Court, sealed the Whatman family's association with a mill destined to have a major impact on the papermaking industry worldwide.

Over the next twenty years James Whatman senior focussed on developing the highest quality paper. He invented the *Wove* papermaking process for printer and type designer John Baskerville's famous quarto edition of Virgil. His pioneering technique involved the use of a wire gauze mesh to achieve a uniform unlined surface. However, it was the son of James and Anne who was to establish the *J. Whatman* watermark on an international level.

Born in 1741, the younger James inherited the business aged eighteen when his father died in 1759. On turning twenty-one he took complete control with an entrepreneurial flair to match James the Elder. His development in the use of blue smalts (a pigment consisting of powdered glass and oxide of cobalt) to enhance the brightness of white paper, instantly increased the popularity of Whatman paper among artists and printers. Thomas Gainsborough and JMW Turner became enthusiastic customers and the poet William Blake used the paper for his illuminated books declaring it: "The most beautiful wove paper that could be procured."

When the Society for Antiquaries requested paper to print an image of Henry VIII meeting Francis I at the Field of the Cloth of Gold, James produced the large handmade sheets required. "The span of a vatman's arms" was the accepted maximum measurement until Whatman became the first company ever to make this larger size paper, naming it *Antiquarian* after the commissioning Society.

Whilst acknowledging the necessity to maintain his primary business location at Turkey Mill, James decided in 1783 to vacate the relatively modest proportions of Turkey Court in favour of far grander domestic arrangements at Vinters Park. Four years of extensive improvements to the property followed before he finally took up full-time residence in 1787.

Ten years later, despite having suffered a stroke in 1790, James followed the fashion of the aristocracy in contracting Humphry Repton to re-design the Park for a fee of fifty guineas. Repton, by now established as the leading landscape gardener in England, was renowned for presenting prospective clients with red Moroccan leather bound books, containing stylish explanatory text and concepts illustrated by maps and watercolour views. His *Red Book* for Vinters is preserved at the Yale Centre for British Art, Prints and Drawings.

James Whatman did not live to enjoy Repton's picturesque vistas from the windows of his Georgian salon; he died in 1798 before Repton completed work on the Park and was buried at Boxley church. The papermaking business was taken over by William Balston who, in 1805, moved the Turkey Mill operation to Springfield Park Maidstone – a thoroughly modern steam powered mill.

And so as a new century began Whatman father and son fell from view, leaving an iconic papermaking legacy which continues to this day. Over the next one hundred and fifty years their fine quality paper would be used by Napolean Boneparte to write his Will and chosen by Queen Victoria for her personal correspondence. During the 1920's Soviet leaders published their vision for a future USSR on Whatman paper, and at the end of World War II it was used by the authors of the Peace Treaty with Japan; awe-inspiring achievements for an enterprise which sprang from slender beginnings on the banks of the River Len.

Nearly two years ago, Ben Byfield and I arrived at Leeds Castle as the Estate Rangers. The CEO, Sir David, was keen to move away from pure forestry work, and to create a new department with an eye to conservation, development and education rather than just maintenance. And so we have set about our task, hoping to take this great estate to new heights in presentation, caring equally for the furthest woods as much as for the parkland surrounding the Castle.

February was rung in by the first drumming's of the Greater Spotted Woodpecker and, as the snowdrops pushed their way up through winters thaw, we are now seeing and hearing signs that spring is well on the way, despite the most recent March gales.

Over the last month we have found that a number of different birds have either passed through or taken up residence in and around the estate, one of which was quite a rare sighting for this part of the UK. Cinclus cinclus, commonly known as a Dipper, tend only to be found to the west and north of the UK, preferring the fast-flowing upland and lowland rivers, so it's no wonder then to find such a bird scouting out the babbling brook below the Barbican. Other birds of note to mention are the Great Crested Grebes that nest here each summer and if you head down to the moat in early spring you may just see their fascinating courtship dance.

As the end of tree felling season creeps ever closer we too are drawing to a close on our woodland work. As the Leeds Castle Ranger team our goal is to help nature across the estate through habitat management. One of the best ways to improve biodiversity in woods is to create wider tracks or rides, so with the help of our volunteers we set to work on Hawk Wood. Weeks and days of tree felling and brash stacking entailed. The increased space and light on the woodland floor will create a much greater diversity of vegetation and therefore niches for different plants and animals. Flowering plants will grow beside dense young saplings and then finally taller trees in the woodland behind.

Since working in Hawk wood we have carried out this same principle in many other woodlands, creating open space by coppicing and felling and opening access for future work. We're restoring our lost area of lowland heath, rejuvenating the wet woodland below Broomfield church and saving some amazing veteran oak trees that are being smothered by younger trees. We're also getting rid of invasive laurel and rhododendron that will take over a woodland if you let it.

Nature conservation projects are rarely profitable though, so back in April we applied for grant funding to make our woodlands work for us as a charity. The process was very long and drawn out with lots of office work, but in the days just before Christmas we received confirmation that Leeds Castle has now entered a 5-year, higher tier countryside stewardship scheme. This means we are committed to complete all the work agreed with the Forestry Commission and Natural England and we're on a push now to find more volunteers to help us to achieve this.

As this busy time of year draws to an end we are now gearing up for our spring and summer wildlife surveys. They'll act as our results day for our winter work, telling us whether we've had a positive effect or not. The first surveys start in early April with our Breeding Bird Survey. This must be carried out a little after sunrise and it means some very early starts- but it is worth it for this most spectacular time of the day. Also we will be monitoring Butterfly's and Bees and are ready to start a new reptile monitoring program across the sunnier spots of the golf course.


Other exciting news is that we are helping to facilitate the installation of three ponds on the estate to provide valuable sites for Great Crested Newts to breed. This is part of a nationwide project to help newt populations increase in numbers. For this we must thank the Medway Valley Countryside Partnership who are leading the project in this area. They help us with a number for conservation projects and surveys including our on-going Dormouse survey and the barn owl monitoring.

The spring months also prompts the start of our tree safety management where we assess each tree that could in pose a hazard to visitors and staff. This time of year is ideal as we can easily see up through the canopy due to the lack of leaves. This will then provide us a list of hazardous trees that have to be managed, but as we have already carried out work on over 200 trees in the past year we hope that this list will be quite small.

We hope that in the coming months we can say we have had a positive effect on biodiversity here at Leeds Castle, but only time will tell. We could not have done this work if it were not for the help of our dedicated team of volunteers that come out with us each week to help us make a difference to the estate's various habitats. If you want to help us with our practical work or biological surveys, then please do get in touch as we are always on the look-out!


