SCAMMERS—PLEASE REMAIN VIGILANT

Recently we have been contacted by various residents to advise of scams that they have come across. We wanted to remind residents to be mindful about who they pass information to. Scammers are contacting residents by post, text message, phone calls and sometimes on doorsteps. They often pretend to be someone they are not or offer misleading services or investment opportunities.

These scams may be someone asking for donations for causes such as Ukraine, someone contacting you regarding coming into contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID or even someone impersonating your bank. Scammers come in all shapes and sizes.

Below are some tips on staying safe..

Ask for ID. If they are who they say they are then they will carry some form of ID.

Never give out your bank card PIN number (not even your bank will ask for this).

Charity Collectors will always be able to supply a registered charity number that you can check.

Never let strangers into your house, even to use the toilet.

If you receive a letter you think is a scam, ignore it, throw it in the bin and never reply.

If in doubt hang up and call the organisation back using a number from a statement or letter that you know is genuine .

Be wary of text messages from strange numbers and never click on links unless you have checked them.

Some good advise from age UK is;

You don't have to open the door to anyone you don't know. If you do, always think:

Stop, Lock, Chain and Check

- Stop Are you expecting anyone?
- Lock If not, lock any other outer doors before answering the front door, as some scammers do work together.
- Chain Put the door chain on (but remember to take it off again or people with a key, like home help, won't be able to get in). Look through the window or spy-hole to see who's there.
- Check Ask for an identity card and examine it carefully. If you're still unsure, phone the company the person says they're from. Get the number from a bill or your phone book. Don't worry about leaving someone waiting if they're who they say they are, they won't mind. If you're being pressured or feel unsafe, contact friends, family or the police

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What is The Three Suttons Helpline?

The Three Suttons Helpline has been operating as a "good neighbour" scheme for about 20 years to make life easier for those needing to get to medical appointments, but who do not have their own transport or cannot easily be helped by family or friends and for whom public transport is infrequent and not a viable option. This scheme now arranges and gives over 400 lifts a year and covers the villages and surgeries in Sutton Valence, Chart Sutton, East Sutton, Kingswood and Langley.

The Helpline is operated entirely by volunteers who are not paid for their work: the three ladies who answer telephone requests and arrange the journeys and the 20 volunteer drivers. Donations from the users of the scheme pay towards telephone calls and petrol costs. A number of the local parish councils and a local charity have kindly donated money which goes towards insurance, publicity and other costs.

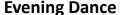

After the Pandemic – Getting back to normal.

It seems strange, but at the same time, almost inevitable, that, after nearly two years of restricted movement and the constant worry about the effects of catching COVID, some of us find that we have some difficulty of moving around in the COVID world.

The problem is much more profound than it first seems; it feels almost trivial that there is some difficulty in returning to normal. I observe behaviours in myself and many of those close to me who still have great difficulty in getting about again. The fear built up over the last two years, the scary press stories of how people and communities have been affected together with confusing information have left us with a level of anxiety which many find difficult to cope with. This is called the Covid Anxiety Syndrome.

The syndrome had been recognised by several authorities and I believe that now is a good time to find ways to overcome it, before it becomes ingrained into our systems.

To this end I did a recent study into what guidance there is into how one can cope with it. I have turned to the NHS as a sensible centre of excellence and freely admit to laying out some of their advice out in this article and much of what is advised in the article applies very much to my personal knowledge of general anxiety. I know it works but, as with everything worth doing, it needs persistence.

What are the signs? *

Some of the signs of Covid Anxiety Syndrome are:

Trouble thinking about anything other than Covid

Anxiety interferes with daily life – like going to work or to the shops – even when the risk is low.

Isolating from other people when it isn't necessary.

Feelings of hopelessness or being bitter about the pandemic

Trouble sleeping

Feeling unusual physical symptoms, such as frequent headaches or stomach aches.

These signs may occur in varying levels of intensity.

If you feel that you always have the pandemic at the top of your mind then you are probably creating a level of anxiety about it, and it might be useful to look at some of the coping mechanisms listed below.

The 11 tips of coping **

- **1.Go at your own pace** Don't feel that you need to say yes to everything now that restrictions have been lifted, there is no need to rush. Take it step by step, and only do what is comfortable and safe for you. Baby steps will allow you to build your confidence back up.
- **2.Do not avoid things entirely** Avoidance of tough things that generate anxiety may be easier in the short term but will make facing up to them more difficult in the long term.
- **3.Get your information from the right sources** There is lots of conflicting information relating to COVID. Try to limit news and information to trusted sources like GOV.UK and the NHS COVID pages.
- **4.Discuss any changes with others** Before socialising with others, talk to them about the situation to ensure you understand what is comfortable to you and them.
- **5. Make time to relax** Find regular times to relax and lift the stresses off you. Try some online relaxation exercises.
- **6. Challenge unhelpful thoughts** Teach yourself to identify and separate unhelpful thoughts. Perhaps you will find a way to look differently at the thought.

- **7.Tell someone how you feel** Open up to people that you can trust. It could be a friend or family member, a GP, or an online helpline.
- **8.Plan social occasions** By planning social events carefully we can relieve uncertainties. This may be a little as making definite start and finish times or knowing how many people will be there.
- **9. Find routine where you can** The lockdowns have taught us all new routines. It is now time to change them (but not necessarily all). A set routine each day can make a big difference to how you live your life.
- **10.Write down your thoughts** It is sometimes helpful to write down the thoughts that trouble you and allow you to explore then. It is also a good way of tracking your progress.
- **11.Focus on the present** It is very easy to get caught up in the past and fretting for the future. Try to shift your focus onto the present. Relaxation, mindfulness and getting outside and enjoying nature are all good ways to help you focus on the present.

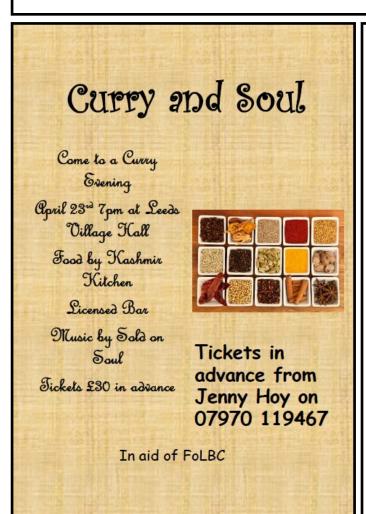
My hope that this short article raises awareness of the problem and offers some help. Further information is readily available on the Internet simple by putting "COVID Anxiety" into a search engine. As mentioned earlier be aware and only search sites that you feel you can trust and that no website that has any merit will ask you to part with money.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING THE NUMBER 59 BUS SERVICE!

To meet the financial challenge being posed by this year's budget, KCC's Public Transport team has been asked to reduce planned spending on supported bus funding by £2.2m.

To achieve this KCC would need to cut 48 contracts with a total value of £3m and affecting around 55 supported bus services from Summer 2022.

The number 59 bus service is one of the services under review and the service could potentially be cancelled all together!

Kent County Council (KCC) is currently consulting on proposals and this consultation closes at midnight on 20 April 2022.

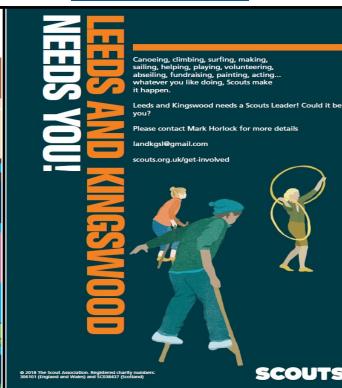

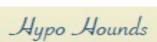
We are very excited this year for things to start going back to normal! It will be lovely attending

Easter egg blondies recipe - BBC Food—https://www.bbc.co.uk/food/recipes/easter_egg_blondies_39122

Ingredients

250g/9oz cold unsalted butter, cut into 6-8 pieces

150g/5½oz light soft brown sugar

125g/41/2oz caster sugar

2 large free-range eggs

1½ tsp vanilla extract

pinch sea salt

300g/10½oz plain flour

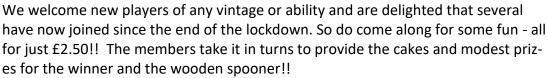
225g/8oz sugar-coated mini chocolate eggs

Method

- Preheat the oven to 190C/170C Fan/Gas 5. Grease and line a 20cm/8in square loose-based cake tin with baking paper.
- Melt the butter in a saucepan over a medium-low heat. Stir in both sugars and cook for 1-2 minutes, or until the butter is absorbed and the mixture turns a creamy toffee colour and looks smooth and glossy. Take off the heat and set aside.
- Whisk the eggs, vanilla and salt together in a large bowl. Whisk in the melted butter and sugar mixture until thoroughly combined, then whisk in the flour until smooth. Pour the batter into the prepared tin and bake for 20 minutes.
- 4. While the blondie is cooking, cut 125g/4½oz of the chocolate eggs in half. It's best to use the heel rather than the tip of the knife and work with just a couple of the eggs at a time.
- 5. When the 20 minutes is up, take the blondie out of the oven and scatter the halved and whole chocolate eggs on top. Carefully press the eggs into the blondie mixture and don't worry if the surface cracks at little. (Take care as the sides of the tin will be hot.) Return to the oven for a further 10 minutes or until the blondie is pale golden-brown.
- 6. Cool the blondie in the tin for at least 10 minutes before cutting into squares. Serve warm or cold

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Kingswood Church article for the Parish News - March 2022



I do hope you managed to survive Storm Eunice with gusts of 122 mph recorded
– the strongest in more than 30 years in the UK. Those of us who are old enough
will remember the hurricane in October 1987, with winds gusting up to 100 mph,
and the havoc that was caused with Kingswood being completely cut-off!

The following Sunday at Church, after Storm Eunice, the appointed New Testament reading was 'Jesus calms the storm' (Luke 8: 22-25) when the disciples were in a boat on the Sea of Galilee with Jesus who was asleep. I wonder how many times we think that Jesus is asleep when we are waiting for an answer to our prayers. Thinking they were in danger of drowning, the disciples woke Jesus up and 'he got up and rebuked the wind and the raging waters; the storm subsided, and all was calm' (8:24). In the same way, when we call on him through prayer. Jesus can calm the troubled waters of our lives.

There is plenty going on during Lent with an Online Lent Course on Zoom from the North Kent Methodist Circuit entitled Becoming Church every Tuesday at 7pm from 8th March to 5th April. Please email me for the link. There is also a series of Lent Talks at Holy Cross Church, Bearsted on the five mid Wednesdays of Lent between March 9th and April 6th. 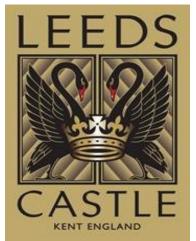




Parish Magazine – March 2022

Spring is here! Daffodils and crocuses are out in full bloom across the estate and cherry blossom is also out. The Culpeper and Pavilion Gardens are slowly coming back to life and we are now looking forward to the annual displays of tulips, bluebells and bearded irises.

February Half Term was a game of two halves, with some busy days and then the horrendous storms in the latter part of the week. As you will be well aware, we had trees down all over the place, including across roads in some places, with many, many others down across the Golf Course and in the Princess Alexandra Gardens. It has taken an enormous amount of work from the team to clear everything up and to get roofs mended across the estate, where tiles blew off.



Sadly, the scale of the damage and the ensuing gales of the next three days meant that we had to close to the public for almost four days, including accommodation and dining bookings. Given it was February Half Term and we were fully booked and expecting to have very healthy visiting, this was clearly very bad news. However, it is essential that we keep everyone safe, so, it was the right decision.

Before the storms blew in, we had thousands of happy visitors following the new Wildlife Trail, highlighting the various birds and beasts who live at the Castle, with Kent Wildlife Trust on site to talk about wild animals and their care. Unfortunately the trail boards blew away in the storms!

Work continues on the major projects we are planning to deliver by April. The new 1930's themed reception for accommodation guests will be completed in the next couple of weeks.

The visitor reception and Park Shop building is now completely gutted, with the internal wall removed and a steel support beam installed. We will now be working on laying new floor, installing electrics, decorating and installing new shop fittings and ticketing desks, with opening anticipated in the second week of April.

At this time, we will also be introducing 80% new shop ranges, closely linked to the stories of the estate. Ranging from local food and drink to Art Deco ranges, garden inspired ranges to new children's and wildlife ranges, there will be something for everyone.

Work continues on the stonework repairs, with the scaffold wrap having to be replaced after Half Term due to storm damage. If you have walked through the estate recently, you will have seen essential repairs being carried out to the causeway wall too.

We are now entering the final stages of our project to Bring the Castle to Life and restore it to the scene of one of Lady Baillie's glamorous house parties. Access to some of the rooms in the Gloriette (the oldest part of the Castle) will be limited over the next few weeks as we make repairs and install Eyemats, a custom made covering that takes an exact photographic image of the floor, to enable guests to enjoy the look of the original floor, while it is protected.

From 4th April, we will be introducing theatrical dressing of rooms, with sounds and smells that make it feel like the occupant (above or below stairs) has just left the room. This will be done in front of the public throughout the week, completing on 11th April ahead of the media launch. All guests will enter through the front door of the Castle, rather than the current Wine Cellar entrance.

Exciting times!

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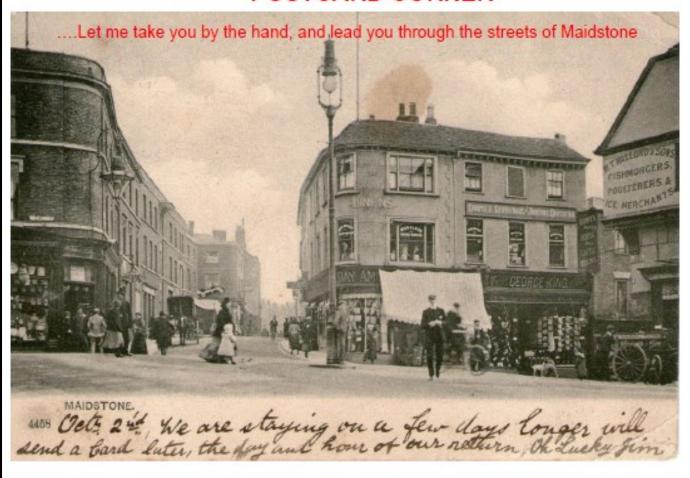
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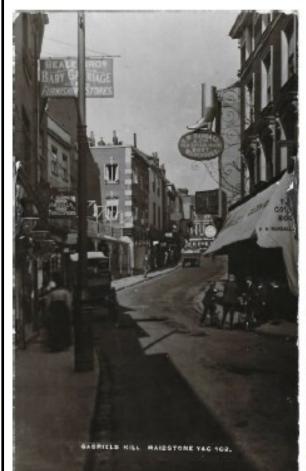
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* POSTCARD CORNER *

Finally, the junction of High Street and Mill Street on this unused card showing tram number 8 on its way to Tovil. Dated somewhere between 1905 and 1910.

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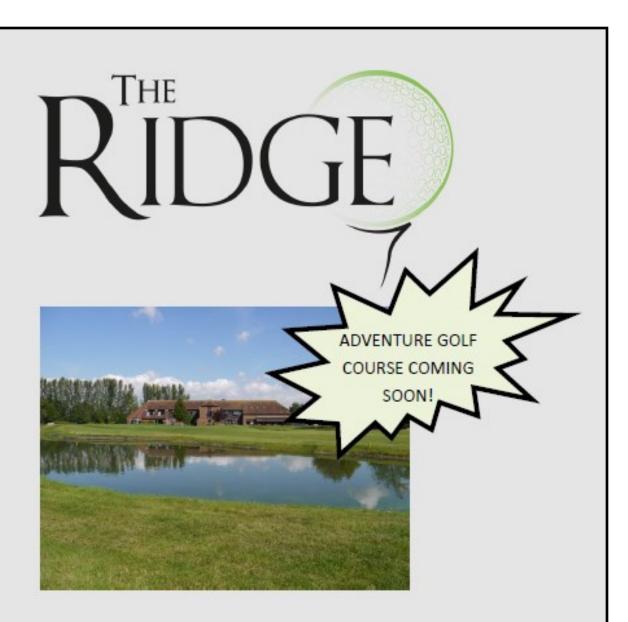
