This iconic figure, which stands as a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made by our servicemen and women in World War 1 and 2 and all the conflicts since holds great significance with residents and in our wider community.

The Tommy statue was repaired and continues to stand as a symbol of remembrance and gratitude.

The vandalism was reported to the Police and a follow up meeting was attended by Councillors. Vandalism of any kind will not be tolerated in our community. If any residents can provide information please contact the Parish Clerk.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation for the outpouring of support and offers of assistance from our community members. Together, we can overcome this act of vandalism and ensure that our Tommy's continue to serve as symbols of gratitude and remembrance.

In unity, we find strength. Let us stand together and demonstrate our unwavering commitment to honoring our veterans and preserving the history that unites us.

ALL INCIDENTS MUST BE REPORTED

The Parish Council recently met with Kent Police to discuss the Silent Tommy damage and other antisocial behaviour happening around our Parish. Something that was very interesting was that the number of reports to the police about incidents were very low! Although it is useful to keep residents informed via social media such as Facebook it is equally just as important to ensure that all incidents are reported to the Police. If incidents are not reported the Police are not aware and cannot respond or take necessary action. One comment the Parish Council receive frequently is that the Police do nothing. Councillors have relayed this back to Kent Police who have assured the Parish Council that all reports are taken very seriously. Things do happen behind the scenes, every report is collated and it enables officers to build up a picture about timings, type of antisocial behaviour etc and a plan of action can be made. There will be more Police presence over the comings months due to the recruitment of more officers. Just because you do not see them doesn't mean they aren't there!

Hurricane October 1987—by Pat Pocock

The evening before the Hurricane we were warned by the TV that there was bad weather on the way but nothing too drastic, so we took care by making sure radio batteries were fully charged, also torches, small portable food/drink heater, water and dried milk and anything else we could think of in case of a power cut which Kingswood was prone to then.

No problem, all ready!

BUT in the early hours of the next morning I was woken up by our daughter Ellen calling out and saying there were leaves falling on her face. I quickly got out of bed, woke up my husband Bob and we went into her bedroom and found the loft hatch had disappeared. He climbed the loft ladder to look and said get dressed and get downstairs as quick as you can. We've lost the top side of the house and it was all open. We could hear a lot of banging and crashing. It was still dark,



went downstairs and thought it might be safer outside. We went outside in a line holding onto each other. The wind nearly knocked us over, it was too much so we went back inside (fortunately the landline and our gravity fed boiler were still working). The wind was really howling. We rang Dad who was alive and well and lived in Grafty Green but he said he couldn't help as there was a tree blocking the road and he couldn't get out. We had a rethink. Bob did architectural drawings at the time and said the safest place was under a door frame or under the stairs, so we sat in the cupboard under the stairs listening to the radio.

Some people have asked "weren't you scared". I wasn't as we were all together. The only

time I was scared was two days later when a couple of tiles fell off the roof landing right behind me and that really did put the wind up me. The roof was repaired better than ever but Bob's new company car certainly wasn't as it was covered in bricks. Friends gave us meals and a tarpaulin in exchange for a shower for whoever wanted one, so yes, it wasn't forgotten especially as it was our brother-in-laws birthday which he never lived down. We asked him to change it, but I think he said no. My husband got another car but he



wanted to park in any neighbours drive - not in ours. So we didn't forget that night.

Snowed up—by Pat Pocock

After the Hurricane in October everything was back to normal for a while, or so we thought, and settled down for the winter which was a cold one, so when we woke up one morning to find mountains of snow everywhere we weren't too happy and very surprised.

We had two small shops in the village plus a post office in the Lenham Road. It wasn't too long before essentials were running low as deliveries and people struggled to get in and out of Kingswood. We were all getting concerned so emergency services were called and a helicopter drop was on the way.

It landed in the school playing field and for weeks after people standing in the field smelt of oil, but they didn't really mind.

You will see I also left a photo of Rupert Bear stretched out at the school, which I found whilst looking for the others and thought you might be interested in the story connected with it. As you probably know up to several years ago there was an annual race of at least 20 big air balloons which started at Leeds castle and then normally came up over Kingswood - depending on the wind direction. Most years one or two used up all their gas getting up the hill and dropped in the village. This particular year Rupert, far and away the biggest, also "ran out of puff "and fortunately landed in the school grounds (instead of on someones house or the road) covering the entire playing field. The childen thought this was fantastic.



Kingswood Speedwatch Group

The local Speedwatch group is a mix of people all from our local community, volunteering their time to undertake sessions around local roads and has support from the Parish council. This can be from an hour a month to a couple of hours a week, there is no expectation to do sessions it's just when people have



available time. It has enabled people in the group to get to know more people from within our own village.

The group operates on various approved sites around the village, its aim is to try to educate road users of the importance of respecting the speed limits.

<u>You</u> can help us try to keep speeds under control, by joining our group to enable us to carry out more sessions.

<u>You</u> can make a difference, training is provided and you can get to meet other people from the local community.

Quote from PC Jason Wright—17th October 2023

I have supported the Kingswood group, as a police community engagement and enforcement officer. I attended a number of sessions they were undertaking in and around the village in recent weeks, to provide visible support for their work.

In addition to supporting them, I also undertake my own active enforcement based on data provided by Kingswood and other Speedwatch groups from across Kent.

My aim is to make roads in Kent safer for all by offering high visible speed enforcement.

I am only able to do this thanks to the data provided by the Kingswood Speedwatch group evidencing speeding issues in the village.

The future goal is simple, to reduce road deaths to zero, or as close as possible, in Kent by 2050. Among other things it is the plan for Kent to be at the forefront of road safety innovations.

I would ask the community to help Kingswood by actively supporting them wherever you can whether that be a passing 'thank you' or if you are able, join them in volunteering and do your part for your village and help support us in saving lives and reducing road traffic collisions in Kent.

Trenches


As the sun splashed knives of gold,

KENT CYNOPHOBIA ASSISTANCE GROUP

Monday evenings at 5.30

Cynophobia is a Greek word, Cyno is dog, Phobia is fear, so it simply means the 'fear of dogs' We are now in our 8th year, having helped so many children overcome their fear of dogs. We have 14 dogs on our list, we have a rota of seven dogs each Monday, helping on average each week 20 children. We are always on the lookout for new dogs, they do have to have some basic training and are off sound temperament.

Our success rate is that 90% of children stroke a dog within the first hourly session, often to the amazement of parents. These children having had a lot of encouragement to even get out of their car.

Over the years, we are proud to say that we have changed so many families lives for the

Lead the Way Dog Training. Wednesday evenings.

We run Puppy training classes following the Kennel Club Puppy Foundation Course, after which you can continue with us and gain the KC Bronze, Silver and Gold awards. We are also experienced with rescue dogs too. We run very popular dog training classes throughout the evening.

Our senior trainer is a Kennel Club Accredited Instructor, City & Guilds and affiliated to the British Institute of Professional Dog Trainers. Last year we lost Marion Street who has moved from the area and so is unable to come along to take some of the classes, although she is still helping on a Monday where many of the dogs we have trained have gone on to become assistance dogs or cynophobia dogs helping the children overcome their fear. 

Opened on 16th July 1927 as the World's Smallest Railway, the R.H. & D. Railway stretches for 13.5 miles from Hythe to Dungeness.

From Hythe to New Romney the line is double tracked, but beyond the line is a single track with a passing place at Romney Sands.

The railway was built by Captain JEP Howey and Count Louis Zborowski to meet their dream of a 15" gauge working express railway.

The war years took their toll, the line being requisitioned by the War Department - they even created the only miniature armoured train in the world - and used extensively during the building of PLUTO (Pipe line under the Ocean), which fuelled the Allied invasion force.

Once peace time returned, the line was re-opened in 1946 with Laurel and Hardy cutting the ribbon.





Engines in the fleet include 4-6-2 British Pacific locomotives based on the A1 class designed by Sir Nigel Gresley for the old LNER.

The series includes:

No.1 Green Goddess.

No.2 Northern Chief,

No.3 Southern Maid,

No.7 Typhoon,

and No.8 Hurricane.

Many of the locomotives are shown on these pages.

Other locomotives are of the 4-6-2 design, as used on the Canadian Pacific Railway. No.9 is Winston Churchill, and the other No. 10 Dr Syn.

No.5 Hercules and No. 6
Samson are 4-8-2 Mountain
class engines, and similar in
design to the Pacifics, but
were originally built with
freight traffic in mind.

In this postcard, Coronation Limited is in fact Hurricane being used on a special event by a group of enthusiasts.





The railway is probably best known for its superb fleet of one-third full size steam and diesel locomotives, all of which have been built to run safely at speeds up to 25mph on rails only 15" apart.

All of the steam locomotives were built between 1925 and 1937, and the R.H & D. Railway operates in much the same way as it did in 1927.





Winter here we come! We have had fantastic Autumn colours out all over the estate for the past couple of months, but the leaves are now falling as the temperatures drop. Storm Ciáran certainly gave the trees a heavy push as it blew through Kent, we closed the estate for the day due to the high winds. Hoping you all kept dry and safe through the storm.

It has been a whirlwind autumn at the Castle and we have just completed a successful October Half Term week, with a troupe of actors creating a spellbinding and immersive Hallowe'en experience for families.



This was swiftly followed by a fully booked Fireworks
Spectacular Weekend, which featured a new approach to projections on the
Castle, with the windows of the Castle being projection-mapped for the first time
and visuals linked directly to the themes of the songs being played. Probably the
first time a series of flying ghosts (Ghostbusters) and a T-Rex (Jurassic Park)
were projected onto the Castle...

From Fireworks, we are now straight into the preparation for Christmas. The second year of the Leeds Castle Christmas Lights Trail will have 80% new light installations and will follow a different route, with a spectacular Light Show on the Castle and large new covered area overlooking the Castle to enjoy food & drink half way round the trail. This stunning ticketed event is selling fast and launches on the evening of 24th November, running until 1st January.

The Castle is closing for 5 days from 13th November for the installation of the Christmas Narnia, Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe experience. The day time Christmas experience of this classic story is included in the annual ticket. Visitors will push their way through coats in the Wardrobe & emerge into Narnia's winter, meeting the White Witch and Mr Tumnus en route. (The actors are present at weekends and during Christmas holidays).

We will also be offering pre-bookable Namia themed Afternoon Teas in the Castle View Restaurant on selected days during December.

The new Lakeside Lodges have now all been swung into position with giant cranes and we are now working on finalising the interiors and the internal furniture fit out. These stunning new holiday lodges located on the Great Water feature star gazing roofs & external baths & open at start December.

Our Falconry & Wildlife Team have been very busy over the past couple of months building a new Wildlife/Bird Hide. Located in the woodland, overlooking a peaceful glade, it is the perfect place to spend the day wildlife spotting. This will be available to book by the day soon.

Watch out for the launch of the Leeds Castle Wildlife Photographer of the Year competition next year, the winning photographs will be displayed in the Castle.

Becoming a Parish Councillor

Have you ever wanted to contribute more to your community? Want to know what's actually involved with regards to being a Parish Councillor?

Please read on

To appreciate what is involved in being a Parish Councillor you need to know what a Parish Council is, and what it can and cannot do. We have to get the image of the Vicar of Dibley out of our mind and understand that the Parish Council is nothing to do with the Church or the Diocese; nor is it a voluntary and community sector body.

"Your Parish Council is the local authority closest to the electorate"

A Parish Council is a separate legal, corporate entity. First created by the Local Government Act of 1894.

A Parish Council also provides services for the local people. These can range from recreation grounds, play areas, allotments, nature reserves, and a cemetery. What can be provided is down to the Parish Council. There is a list of the activities that a Parish Council has the power to provide. Like any statutory body it can only do the things for which the law or any governing body document gives a power.

The Parish Council has one particular asset that is extremely valuable – it has the ability to set a Precept (sum of money), which is collected from all residents through the Community Charge system.

With the right to levy a form of taxation come some duties. In particular a duty to behave in an ethical manner according to a Code of Conduct (declaring interests and leaving the room when likely to be prejudiced) and a duty to have the annual accounts subjected to audit under the aegis of the Audit Commission.

"Training is available and support will be found from colleagues, the Parish Clerk, as well as from the Kent Association of Local Councils"

You may feel uncertain about the knowledge required to be a Councillor and may feel overawed by those who have done the job for years. Rather like the story of the Emperor's New Clothes – the simple question was the key to what was going on. All good Councillors should use the keyword – "Why?" on a regular basis.

Remember – training and support is available.

So, if you want to do more for your community, if you want to spend your time productively, and if you can think, listen and act locally – **why not** consider becoming a Parish Councillor? Speak to Hayley, Parish Clerk NOW!
