Some of you may have noticed that the CCTV at the Sports Field has been upgraded recently. We have always had CCTV at the Sports Field, and it did work however it was very outdated. The upgraded CCTV now covers the whole Sports Field and is live and recording.

VE Day is on the 8th of May and the Parish Council will be celebrating this milestone by holding a bring your own picnic celebration at Kingwood Village Hall on the 10th of May 2pm—5pm. Everyone is welcome and there will be music, games and war time theme exhibits and reels. There will also be an at cost bar! Please do come along, these events are for the whole community to enjoy and come together! More details can be found on page 14.

Two big issues in the Parish currently are nuisance motorbikes and dog fouling. Our local Beat Officer PC Phillips attended a recent Parish Council meeting on the 17th of March where he spoke about the nuisance bikes. He advised as follows; *I am aware of the issues regarding nuisance motorbikes in Kingswood. I chased one of them on foot around the woodland path behind the playing field on Sunday just gone so understand firsthand the problem they cause. I have got CCTV images showing one of the people using the bikes and they will be receiving a visit from me. This is a county wide issue which causes problems in both rural and urban areas so it isn't just yourselves in Kingswood that are effected by this.*

In total for the Kingswood area there have only been 9 calls since the 1st of January 2025 until today. 4 of these 9 calls were over the weekend of the 7th and 8th of March so there is a significant increase which can justify me utilising more of my colleagues in trying to tackle this issue. We can deal with these bikes in various ways, seizure is an option however it is very important that you report any incidents of nuisance motorbikes either online or using 101 or 999 as appropriate. This will enable a clear picture to be built up of how big the issue is in Kingswood so that resources can be allocated to the area.

I cover a large area (Kingswood, Bearsted, Downswood, Otham, Leeds, Langley and Senacre) and therefore cannot always be present but I do follow up calls and I am trying to complete as many foot patrols as possible. Please do chat to me if you see me or alternatively I can be contacted on 101 or Hayley the Parish Clerk is happy to forward emails onto me.

It is very important that all issues are reported to the Police, no matter how small you think they are. If you have time to put the issue on Facebook, you have time to inform the Police. We appreciate there are comments like 'nothing gets done' or 'they don't care' however it does and they do but they need to be aware of what is going on to be able to help. Together we can try to tackle these issues.

A second issue is dog fouling. Hayley our Parish Clerk has been liaising with the Maidstone Borough Council Community Protection team regarding this issue. Pavements have been sprayed and will be sprayed again, stickers have been placed in the Post Office which you can display on your property and they have been placed around the parish. Any public areas where dog poo is present can be reported to Maidstone Borough Council who will attend and clean it up. Ever thought about becoming a Parish Councillor?

To appreciate what is involved in being a Parish Councillor you need to know what a Parish Council is, and what it can and cannot do. We have to get the image of the Vicar of Dibley out of our mind and understand that the Parish Council is nothing to do with the Church or the Diocese; nor is it a voluntary and community sector body.

A Parish Council is a separate legal, corporate entity. A Parish Council also provides services for the local people. These can range from recreation grounds, play areas, allotments, nature reserves, and a cemetery. Like any statutory body it can only do the things for which the law or any governing body document gives a power.

Training is available and support will be found from colleagues, the Parish Clerk, as well as from the Kent Association of Local Councils.

You may feel uncertain about the knowledge required to be a Parish Councillor and may feel overawed by those who have done the job for years. Rather like the story of the Emperor's New Clothes – the simple question was the key to what was going on. All good Councillors should use the keyword – "Why?" on a regular basis. Remember – training and support is available.

So, if you want to do more for your community, if you want to spend your time productively, and if you can think, listen and act locally – why not consider becoming a Parish Councillor? Speak to Hayley, Parish Clerk NOW!



THE LONG FUSE

During the early days of the last world war the rural peace was shattered in the hamlet of Broomfield. As some local picked the fruit harvest in the field behind and above church a crippled German Dornier 17z Bomber came very low down across the large field, between the workers and the bottom of Kingswood. The tremendous impact and explosion following told of this aircrafts final landing and destruction. This raider along with others was on a bombing mission on London, when it was damaged and got detached from the others, when this incident occured. That was Sunday the eight of September 1940.

Sunday 19th. of July 1992 at about 11-00am. A bomb exploded with a dull thud sending a column of smoke and earth into the sky for a few moments. Fifty two years later the Luftwaffe's terrible message of destruction spoke again in our parish. I am pleased to relate that no damage to life or property was caused, only the delay in the crop being harvested in this field. It been different, for since the end of the war this field has been used to grow crops and grain and of course been cultivated to do so. How many times had the earth above this hidden store of destruction been ploughed over by a metal plough drawn through the earth, turning brown furrows in regular patterns across these acres?How many times had this field been harvested by hand or machine to reap the crops grown unaware of the lethal seeds of war time destruction just beneath?

Well, to complete the story of this Dornier's grave the Shoreham Aircraft Presrvation Society obtained permission from the farmer search for the remains of aircraft U5+LN and with necessary equipment, including a JCB digger, soon found traces of aircraft. In fact, after some excavation, an identity plate from some equipment was unearthed marked Dorinier 17, so the dig was on. Progressing further the smell of avaition fuel trapped in earth for over fifty years became apparent. Then a large cylinder which was soon recognised as a bomb stopped the work. This was unexpected as the group had no information munitions surviving the crashed aircraft. The police and bomb disposal team arrived later to deal with this problem. Perhaps the aircraft preservation team were very wise to stop digging as eventually nine more bombs came to light one of which was so unsafe that it was destroyed with a controlled explosion.

So a bomb dropped back in 1940 finally blasted harmlesly fifty

two years later.

Of the crew that September day 1940 all perished in the crash. Only the grave of the pilot Martin Ziems, now buried in cemetery in Sutton Rd.Maidstone, can be seen along with graves of other servicemen both Allied and German.

THE STARTING OF THE KINGSWOOD&BROOMFIELD NEWS

In the early 1960's when we moved to our new bungalow in Kingswood. Broomfield the Parish was divided as is now with the old Hamlet of Broomfield with its 12c Church at the bottom of the hill and the then newly developing area on the edge of Kingswood at the top. In those days only Bungalows were permitted in this area and these built along the fire paths in the wood. Already a few older properties existed with large plots of land as they were usually smallholdings which then began to be sold off in small areas for a few dwellings. The Parish had few facilities but did have a Post Office with a small shop which was opposite a local Pub "The Battle of Britain" which had a small petrol pump in the car park. Also a small wooden hall on the Gravelly Bottom road which had been erected in 1938 by a group of the locals and run by them. Although quite small this little building gave some very good service to the community, serving to hold Parish Council meetings, Sunday school for the Church, local library and general meeting place which included the W. I. and on some occasions a local dance. This Hall was erected and maintained by some of the locals and administered by a small Committee.

In the 1960's most of the men worked out of the village and social contact within Kingswood was maintained by the ladies particularly at the W.I. Meetings. Now when a threat came to want to close this Hall which would mean the stopping of these slender recourses several of the newer residents decided to join the management committee and make some changes. Alan Gentry was voted in as chairman and we set out to try to improve this little structure but it was felt straight away there was only one answer try to build a new Village Hall bigger and nearer to the now growing population. At once it was obvious that a great fund raising was needed and the people of the Village needed to know what was going on as their support was absolutely vital. Now Alan Gentry our new chairman was a sales rep, for a paper company and said that he could provide some paper and suggested that we should start a local magazine and ensure that all within the Parish should receive a copy regularly with no cost to them, a tall order. He also maintained that to save money we could do the printing ourselves by borrowing a Gestetner copier from our local school, which in those days was Ulcombe school in the next village. You will understand that in those days home computing did not exist nor did the home printer. Our only need was a typist to do the initial printing of the Gestetner skin from which the copying was done, one of the wives offered to do this for us. It was also decided to try to get a proper cover for our new magazine. This was done by selling some advertising space on the rear cover which we found would cover the cost for the first 3000 covers after which we would renew the advert or change if required. The colour of the covers was only set by using any colour which the printer had spare. To our surprise there was never a shortage of willing advertisers locally. So Alan put together some copy and the Kingswood & Broomfield News came in to being. First copy 1970.

Being rather a squirrel I have collected all of the past copies which now form a village archive but look forward to the new form of Village newsletter through my coming letterbox.



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
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Kingswood Church article - April 2025

KINGSWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

We've expanded our interests from Birdwatching to include wildlife, as there is so much to see and learn about in this area, and so many skilled and knowledgeable people to help us.

We meet once a month, on the first Monday of the month in the Kingswood Village Hall, in the evening and we try to have guest speakers, and there will be quizzes too. There's a small charge to cover costs.



So far this year, we've had a fascinating and informative talk on the bats which live around us, from Hazel at the Kent Bat Group. She told us how we can encourage and protect them, which species are found here and what to look for. In February, we had an absolutely entrancing talk from Chris about Harvest Mice – an astonishing little mouse, weighing only the same as a 20p coin, which builds a complex and well-engineered nest balanced on a stalk of grass. In March, Lisa from Thorne Hedgehog Rescue told us about her work at the Rescue Centre, she was so entertaining and knowledgeable about these secretive little animals which are so endangered, and we determined to try to do more in Kingswood to protect them. Some group members also participated in the RSPB Great Garden Birdwatch, which the group collates annually.

We will be visiting the Bird of Prey Centre at Leeds Castle to meet the owls in April, and hopefully some of the falcons too. We are also in talks with the Turtle Dove Project with a view to scoping what we can do to attract these disappearing birds to the parish.

MY VOLUNTEERING AT HERITAGE RAILWAYS - Peter Bainbridge 01622 842985

I was born in1941 and for the first 15 years I was living in a house alongside Chatham station, constantly hearing steam trains coming through. I naturally was attracted to the sight and sound of steam locomotives which has continued throughout my life.

I continued living in the Medway Towns (and Cuxton) until 1992, when Maggie and I moved here to Kingswood. At that time we were both still employed. Maggie was a teacher at a school in Strood and I was a civil servant in an office in Chatham. Maggie had to retire early in 1994 due to ill-health and the 30th anniversary of my early retirement occurred on 31st March this year. We both then played lots of golf at The Ridge Golf Club, making many new friends.

In 2003 I started volunteering at the Bluebell Railway, serving as a porter at Sheffield Park station. In the running season I would normally go on duty every Tuesday, joining another porter. Sometimes there would be others joining us. Our duties were clipping tickets at the platform entrance, allocating seats on the coaches for booked parties and when the time came for the train to depart signal to the guard for him (or her) to whistle the train away. As the train was leaving we would be checking that the doors were correctly closed. *My regular travelling route to the station, across country, was 45 miles taking around 75 minutes.*

I continued volunteering at the station through to October 2011 at which time I was aware that my ability to walk naturally was getting awkward and painful. I decided I had to withdraw from being a porter. Over the years I had served with over a dozen different colleagues, enjoying their company, and it became a little emotional to say goodbye. I had been keeping diaries since 1998 and I had recorded the names of all those I had been with each week.

In 2013 I joined a group of new volunteers at the Kent & East Sussex Railway's Tenterden Station. I felt comfortable doing a sit down job and became a booking clerk, selling tickets to customers. The railway had reopened, as a Heritage Railway, in 1974 at Tenterden and over the ensuing years was extended down to reach Bodiam in 2000. Initially I was a clerk at Tenterden where it was very busy, particularly in the mornings. I occasionally served at Northiam station but latterly at Bodiam, where I was regularly with the same personnel: the station master, a man operating the level crossing gates, a platform assistant and a person in the shop. During the period up to October 2024 I had started to use a rollator to provide some assistance in walking, but my condition had gradually worsened, so I decided recently that I could no longer be comfortable getting to and from my car to the station building. Once again I had recorded all the names of my fellow station staff. Saying farewell was like leaving a family, and I have many fond memories. *My travelling route was 21 miles, taking around 45 minutes*.

If any of you have never visited the railway and enjoyed the journey behind a steam locomotive may I recommend you give it a try. Details of the running days, timetables and fares can be found on the K&ESR website.

The railway is considered to be a very friendly railway and always needs more volunteers at all the stations. Perhaps you might consider taking my place, or any of the other roles available, and meeting new friends as I had.

On Tuesdays at Bodiam station a volunteer group come along to maintain the structure - painting, gardening and all DIY activities. If any of you have spare Tuesdays please consider joining the team




Approval has been obtained for the line to be extended from Bodiam to Robertsbridge for completion in 2027. Of course many more volunteers will be needed then.

Hurrah, Spring is finally here! As I write, we have just had a stunning sunny weekend and I am sure I was not the only one out in the garden tidying up ahead of growing season. While the icy temperatures are set to return this coming week, it really does feel like Spring is here.

We still have reams of beautiful snowdrops out across the estate, with daffodils now starting to open en masse. Purple, white and yellow crocus are also out, as are the hellebores. Tulips are also developing well, let's hope they don't get damaged by the incoming frost.

We had a very successful February Half Term with the *Chaos in the Castle* event receiving excellent feedback from guests.



The desk in question is a beautifully hand painted Secretaire (Writing Desk), designed for Leeds Castle by Lady Baillie's interior designer Stephane Boudin. The desk left the collection in the 1970's and we have been delighted to re-acquire it recently, thanks to a grant from National Lottery Heritage Fund. The Secretaire arrived a couple of weeks ago and is now on display in Lady Baillie's Boudoir.

We were pleased to secure funds from National Lottery Heritage Fund last year to work on a number of areas, including energy efficiency, green transport, carbon footprint and better access.

After completing a full estate access audit, we have been making improvements to accessibility in all its forms, working with groups like 21 Together (a local charity supporting families who have a child with Downs' Syndrome). This has led to improvements in pre-visit Access Information on the website and the recent installation of a new ramp to access the Stable Yard Café.

In early March we introduced Sensory Packs for loan, including ear defenders, fidget toys and soft toys, to help people with sensory issues to have an enjoyable visit. These have been hugely popular already and it looks like we will need to introduce more!


We have also been working with Hollingbourne Station to introduce better signage for those who arrive by train to reach the Castle by green means. We had also arranged for the Stagecoach 10X bus between Ashford and Maidstone to call in to the Estate to make green travel more possible. We had also installed a ramp at our Estate bus stop to improve access for all. Frustratingly, after the recent departure of a senior Stagecoach colleague, this service has been withdrawn to Saturday only. We will continue to press for its reinstatement or replacement.

Main visitor season is coming up quickly now and our Easter Trail will be Horrible Histories themed, with a chocolate coin reward. Horrible Histories will be back for a Medieval Week over May Half Term, when the annual Joust will also be on site.

Mothers' Day is at end March this year and it is looking like all the daffodils (and potentially some tulips) will be out in celebration. You can book for a delicious Mothers' Day afternoon tea at the Castle View Restaurant.

15th March is our annual day offering free entry to National Lottery players, in recognition of the grants received from the National Lottery Heritage Fund. This is also the day that we launch the Pavilion Pre-Loved Book Shop for the season. 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
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
