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The Aero Club of Great Britain [AeCGB] was founded in 1901 to promote aviation, initially ballooning, which was then a rich man's hobby. They licensed *aeronauts* as balloon pilots were known, organised ballooning events and liaised with other international bodies.

When in 1908 the Wright brothers brought the latest version of their biplane [the Flyer] to demonstrate in France the AeCGB joined the throngs of spectators. The Wrights had considerably improved the original aircraft and were seeking Manufacturers to build their design under licence. The AeCGB recommended the balloon manufacturers Short Brothers who were also their technical advisers. The Shorts were keen to diversify into aircraft and applied for a licence to build six.



In Feb 1909 the AeCGB acquired land in Sheppey for the first ever flying field in Britain covering 400 acres at Shellbeach on the coast at Leydown-on-Sea and including Mussel Manor to be a club house. The land was purchased by a member Francis [Frank] Mclean [of Tunbridge Wells] and leased for a nominal rent. Short Bros also leased part of the site to build the first aircraft factory in the world. In addition to the six Wright planes they were building their own designs.

Flying began in April 1909. On 2 May John Moore-Brabazon [later Lord Brabazon] made the first officially recorded flights in Britain achieving a distance of 1500 feet in a French built Voisin. On 4 May the site was visited by the Wright brothers. He later sold the Voisin and purchased the second Short Wright aircraft in which he flew a circular mile on 30 October winning a Daily Mail prize as the first to achieve it in Britain. He later took Icarus the flying piglet up in a basket to prove pigs could fly.! He became the first person in Britain to qualify as a pilot, receiving RAeC Aviators Certificate No 1. [In 1910 the AeCGB had received the 'royal' designation].

By the end of 1909 it was becoming clear that Shellbeach had defects. While the level surface and lack of trees had led to its selection, the surface was rough and breached by drainage channels causing a number of landing accidents. Frank McClean came to the rescue, buying land at Eastchurch further inland and on higher ground which again he leased at a nominal rent. Shorts leased land for their factory.

Club founder the Hon. Charles Rolls [of Rolls Royce] made the first landing at Eastchurch on 20th November 1909. He was an experienced balloon pilot and rapidly built up experience in his new Short Wright. On 2nd June 1910 he made the first non stop double crossing of the English Channel. Sadly he became the first fatality of powered flight in Britain when he crashed on 12th July giving a flying display at Bournemouth.

1910 was a very active year in British aviation not least at Eastchurch where members were erecting hangars for their personal aircraft. There was much going on elsewhere in Britain, Frank McClean was very active not least in support of Short Bros. He was a great patron of the company and purchased fifteen of their aircraft. He was also initially their test pilot and flew many of their early products. Shorts rapidly grew as a company and developed an innovative range of products. They quickly moved from the Wright design to building tractor aircraft and abandoned the skid for wheeled undercarriages. They also built the first twin-engined aircraft. They also experimented with flotation and developed a range of seaplanes.

In February 1911 McClean approached the Admiralty with a proposal to train naval pilots at Easstchurch for free using his two aircraft and RAeC instructors. On 2nd March four volunteer officers reported for training which was completed by early May. Work began immediately on forming a flying branch of the Royal Navy. The Admiralty leased part of the flying ground to become a flying school and a ground school. It took over the entire project in 1914 and in 1918 when the RAF was formed it became RAF Eastchurch. The formation of the Royal Naval Air Service is another story much of it happening in Kent.

Want to know more? Mussel Manor is now the Muswell Manor Hotel with a fine display of photos and other ephemera about the 'early days'. Eastchurch is now HMP Standforth Hill but in a former air navigation classroom on the site is the Eastchurch Aviation Museum dedicated to flying on Sheppey with a large collection about the 'early days' <u>https://eastchurchaviationmuseum.org.uk</u>

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PEOPLE AND PLACES IN PROFILE

The Len Valley and Beyond

For over two hundred years the Stacey family maintained a status within Maidstone as successful brewers, bankers and landowners. Three generations of the family produced sons who became mayors of Maidstone and soldiers who gained distinction in the Peninsula and Zulu wars. However, it was a daughter born in 1791 who linked the family name forever with the poetry of the Romantics through her brief, beguiling influence on, arguably, the finest and most radical of them all – Percy Bysshe Shelley.

Sophia Stacey was the eighth of nine children born to Flint Stacey and his wife Katherine. The family brewing business, Isherwood, Foster and Stacey, founded in Maidstone during the 17th century, ensured Stacey's position as a prominent local businessman on the inheritance of a partnership. Within a year of his daughter's birth he became Mayor of Maidstone; in 1793 he ex-



panded his business interests by funding a private bank with fellow investors, Brenchley, Parker and Penfold. This profitable enterprise, which became known as The Kentish Bank, flourished well into the next century. Flint Stacey was rich, influential and prosperous – only tragedy could halt his winged progress.

Sophia's secure childhood was shaken at the age of five by the early death of her mother Katherine. In 1794 thirty -four year old Katherine gave birth to her last child, a boy called Edwin; she died before Edwin reached his second birthday. For the next five years Flint Stacey kept the family together. The bank and the brewery continued to prosper and he was elected mayor for the second time in 1801 – a year later, aged fifty-seven, he too was dead.

Events then evolved which would ultimately lead Sophia's destiny towards Shelley: On Flint Stacey's death the family of six surviving children were separated. Stacey's banking partners were appointed guardians to the youngest children; Edwin became a ward of his godfather Edwin Penfold, while eleven year old Sophia's guardians were Robert and Helen Parker. She remained with the Parkers for at least three years forming a close bond with Helen Parker, Shelley's paternal aunt.

After leaving the Parkers Sophia Stacey's story becomes sketchy for a decade or so. There are hints of royal connections through Maria Fitzherbert, companion of George IV. Portraits of her and Edwin were painted by the celebrated Court artist William Grimaldi, a close friend of their father. During these elusive years Sophia grew into an attractive young woman. Contemporaries describe her as dark haired with striking eyes, talented musically with a sweet singing voice and of, "some fortune." These attributes would at that time have given merit to her eligibility as a wife – but when she re-emerges in 1819 she is twenty-eight years old, travelling in Europe and still unmarried.

Sophia's continental travels are recorded as an undertaking of the Grand Tour. On reaching Florence in November 1819 she lodged with Shelley and his second wife Mary (author of Frankenstein) at their pensione on Via Valfonda. Her introduction to the Shelleys almost certainly came through Helen Parker. A heavily pregnant Mary Shelley, aware of her husband's creative, political and social free spirit – which so often shaped the nature of his female attachments – immediately befriended Sophia, possibly in a bid to hinder an *affaire de coeur*.

Regardless of Mary's efforts, Sophia and Shelley struck-up an instant rapport, delighting in each other's company and spending many hours together touring the sights of Florence. He wrote verses for which she composed music and sang to him as she played the harp. Shelley's biographer James Beiri states, "The lyrics Shelley wrote for the well named Sophia are among his most passionate." There were secret rendezvous and the strength of Shelley's sensibilities is expressed in his poem *Ode to Sophia Stacey* which begins:

Thou art fair and few are fairer... Those soft limbs of thine whose motion, Ever falls and shifts and glances As the life within them dances.

At the end of November Mary Shelley gave birth to a son. The baby was named Percy with Florence added as a middle name at Sophia's suggestion – a name then unknown for a child. Shortly afterwards a daughter was born into that closely connected, upper middle-class circle residing in the city; she was christened Florence by her parents William and Frances Nightingale. Sophia Stacey had unwittingly established a new name which would one day become universally famous through this baby girl.

January 1820 saw Sophia's departure to Rome. On the day she left her diary entry reads: "...he is suffering and in very delicate state of health." Shelley's parting gift was a book of further verses. In Rome that spring she received a letter from him together with an inscribed poem, *On a Faded Violet* – which speaks of kisses, loss and weeping. They never met again and Shelley drowned two years later.

Sophia eventually returned to Maidstone and in 1823 her wedding to Captain James Catty was hosted by Maria Fitzherbert. The couple lived at Hill House Stockbury where their three children were born. In later years Sophia corresponded regularly with Percy Florence Shelley, an exchange in which he sent her unpublished lyrics written by his father. Some of their letters are held at the Bodleian Library Oxford. Sophia's memorial is at Stockbury's St Mary Magdalene church where she was buried on her death in 1874.

Following distinguished army careers, her brother Edwin and her son Charles continued the family tradition as brewers and mayors of Maidstone; through them the Stacey family's civil and business standing in the town remained strong. Prevented as a woman from pursuing such roles, Sophia Stacey's life is more essentially defined by those ephemeral moments, in which she exquisitely inspired the complex, tragic, visionary Shelley. In dedicating verses to her, the poet gave glorious focus to the intensity of their fleeting liaison, carving her name irrevocably within the narrative of early 19th century Romanticism.

The Kingswood Village Hall was the location for an afternoon tea where tables were set out with an eclectic mix of vintage crockery and table cloths.

People had kindly donated home-made cakes and biscuits and the cosy tearoom setting was ideal for chatting over a cuppa. With, at least 40 people present, it gave visitors, and residents, a chance to find out about each other's cultures.

At one point in the proceedings there was a short DVD presentation of local scenery and historic buildings. Then more chat ... and cake!

The American ladies commented on the china and requested cake recipes and both ladies & gentlemen present were interested in the significance of Remembrance Sunday. They took poppies home as small souvenirs and the History Denver Guides thanked us for our warm hospitality and a chance to meet "real" people. 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Shukokai Karate Academy

It is now 12 months since the formation of the Shukokai Karate Academy, based in Kingswood Village Hall, and during that time there have been some exciting developments and achievements. The Academy has now been accepted as a full member of the English Karate Federation and is very proud to have achieved the approval of the Code for Safeguarding in Martial Arts, which ensures that all of our students can be confident of training in a safe and protected environment.

The club has continued to run classes on both Tuesdays and Thursdays in the village hall for students from the age of 4 upwards and pride themselves on involving not only traditional karate but also helping students to prepare for the sport side of karate, which is expanding all the time. The "Little Ninjas" classes are as popular as ever, giving our youngest students the opportunity to participate in some exercise and games whilst learning the basics of karate. Students have attended several competitions around the country and have had great success in winning many medals. The Academy also hosted its first Invitational Open Competition which attracted competitors from outside the club and was a great success and will be holding their annual club competition and presentation day in November.

The Academy has now published its own detailed syllabus, which enables students to follow their own progress and allows them to check on what they need to know to achieve their next grade.

Sensei Chris Simpson and Sensei Stephen Pereira have refereed at several National and local competitions, including the WKIF World Championships and have both progressed to qualified English Karate kumite judges. Sensei Katie Simpson and Luke Carpenter have both passed their English Karate Coaching exams and we anticipate several other students will follow on in due course.

Classes have been run for students at Ulcombe Primary school and currently in Kingswood Primary school and New Line Learning Academy.

The Academy has run training courses to which guest instructors have been invited, including international competitor and Olympic hopeful Alton Brown and former National coach Rafael Veras, which has given students the opportunity to widen their experience of karate. Courses are already being arranged for 2020 with some exciting and dynamic coaches lined up.

Remember, it is never too late to start! If there are any adults who have considered taking up karate, simply to learn the martial art, gain fitness or to just to enjoy burning off some energy after a hard day at work, come and join us; the first trail lesson is free.

As well as Kingswood the Academy now runs clubs at seven other different venues, Downswood, Lenham, Sutton Valence, Marden, Maidstone YMCA, New Line Learning Academy and Warmlake and once a member of the Academy students can train at any of the venues in an appropriate class. After the wonderful SATs results in the summer, it's been an exciting first term here at Kingswood Primary School. With the launch of the ASPIRE Federation on the 6th September, the new school year literally took off from there.

Ensuring that the children are inspired and engaged at every opportunity both academically and socially, alongside Teaching and Learning we have focused on pupil and staff well-being. It is important to teach children the tools to 'be well' through values, PSHE and an enriched curriculum, enhancing every aspect of their day, now and later on in life. Since September we have:



- Introduced DEAR time; Drop Everything And Read. Where staff and pupils are given 15 minutes each morning to read for pleasure; modelling great reading habits and promoting that reading isn't just part of an English lesson!
- Reading Buddy Assemblies every Tuesday morning, Oak class read with the younger year groups. This encourages reading, as well as highlighting that it's nice to have someone to learn with.
- Launched our Federation Well-being Logo Competition and found a winner!
- Found our pupil Kingswood Roles and Responsibility Representatives. Through an application process, we now have School Council Reps, House/Vice Captains, Librarians and Well-being Ambassadors.
- Well-being Focus Day. All pupils came off of curriculum, where they focused on positive ways to identify how they are feeling, as well as identify how others are feeling and ways in which to interact with them in a supportive way, twinned with our values of Kindness, Love, Boldness, Understanding, Patience and Honesty. Joining us on that day, we also had a professional child yoga specialist lead an hour session with each year group. The response from pupils was fantastic!
- We welcomed 18 children to Year R in September you may have seen their photograph in the First Class supplement in the Kent Messenger in October.
- The Lenham School have come into school to do Outdoor Games with the Year 1, 2, 3 & 4 children and Gymnastics with Year 3, 4, 5 & 6 children.
- We have played a football match against Headcorn Primary School.
- We held our first Open Afternoon of the year we have two more planned (see further on in the article for more details).
- All the donations received at our Harvest Assembly were taken to the Maidstone Day Centre for the Homeless.
- Chestnut Class made pizzas at Pizza Express in Maidstone.
- The Friends of Kingswood School have arranged an Autumn Ball for all children to take place later this week.
- We continue to offer guitar lessons to the children and other extra-curricular clubs including Dawn Raiders, Dance Club, Football, Film Club, and Crusaders.

What a difference a day makes! I write this the day after the storm, and the first time that Leeds Castle has ever had to cancel a fireworks display. The Leeds Castle Fireworks Spectacular is generally recognised as one of the best displays in the South and attracts about 9,000 on each night. Many come from far away, staying overnight in local hotels, some then enjoying further hospitality that Kent offers. The event is over a year in the planning and execution, and many decide to join one of the overnight House Parties in the Castle, to make the visit very special indeed. We not only have our own caterers on duty, but many smaller, independent catering contractors accept our invitation to serve the many thousands of guests, allowing them to make an income during the quiet, early winter period. Cancellation, as you can imagine, is therefore a big deal. While those who were not able to see the display last night will be refunded the cost of their ticket, I am sure that they and their young ones will continue to be disappointed at not being able to enjoy this year's spectacular. I apologise to all of them but my foremost responsibility is the safety of all who come on to the Leeds Castle estate and, in all the circumstances, I simply could not guarantee yesterday the safety



of our visitors. Today the sun is shining, the wind has dropped and I am in no doubt that 9,000 people will have the most wonderful time when we open the gates at 2pm, and the full thirty minute fireworks display starts in the early evening.

You will be reading this not too long before Christmas. For us at Leeds Castle, this has been a memorable year. The 900th anniversary celebrations are nearly over and I reflect very positively on what we have achieved. Every event has been spectacular but, two occasions stand out in my mind. The first was the visit by our Patron, Princess Alexandra, when she formally opened our woodland gardens in her name. We joke with her that she is the longest serving employee of Leeds Castle, and two years ago we presented her with her long service brooch! The naming of an area of the estate in her name was entirely proper and fitting, not least because we have done so much to transform the area, and make it a reason to visit Leeds Castle in itself. Her presence brought delight to all who work here and, when she laid the Time Capsule on the Castle Island Lawn, to be opened in 2119, we were joined by many young children from the local schools. The fact was not lost on me that, in all likelihood, some of those children could just be around in 2119 (medical science permitting!), to see the capsule opened, and will reflect back on that wonderful, sunny day in 2019.

The second event that stands out for me is the *Carnival of History*. A new and unique event for Leeds Castle, this not only brought the most wonderful celebratory party to Leeds Castle but, was a party delivered by the broadest cross-section of the wider community, including many who might not otherwise have dreamt of visiting the Castle. The sight of the local Nepalese community dancing on the Castle Island lawn, enthralling others with their joy and passion, will never be lost on me. Likewise, seeing children dressed up and excited by the magic of the parade, was a sight to behold. A truly fitting tribute to a landmark heritage sight, at the heart of a diverse community in Kent.

The Christmas period is almost upon us. Our Christmas Market will be erected as soon as the fireworks display is over and we can expect (weather permitting), well over 40,000 people to visit over the four weekends that the market operates. They will also enjoy the decorated Castle, this year's theme being Magical Birds and Festive Feathers, reflecting Olive Baillie's love of birds. That will draw to a close an amazing year in which Leeds Castle has promoted itself on the national and international stage, celebrating an impressive milestone in its continuing story.

Some have asked me whether or not *Leeds Castle 900* has been a success. My answer is a resounding yes. Have we attracted thousands of more visitors than in previous years? Not really. However, from the very first month of the year when we featured on *Countryfile*, the very popular TV show, all the way through to this December when we will feature on another very popular TV series (to be announced), we have attracted interest from far and wide. We have established ourselves very firmly on the podium of the great Treasure Houses of England and we have used the good fortune of our age to best advantage.

Each Quarter, the Association of Leading Visitor Attractions (basically, those sites that attract more than one million visitors a year) conducts a survey to establish which of its 94 sites deliver the best experience to its

visitors. Leeds Castle is not a full member of ALVA because we don't attract over one million visitors a year but, because we work alonaside places like Chatsworth and Blenheim, we are included in the survey. In the Spring survey, Leeds Castle was judged best in class and, most recently, we won the same accolade in the Summer survey. This is a remarkable outcome, especially when you consider that the competition includes the likes of Westminster Abbey, The Tower of London, the V&A and Windsor Castle. Leeds Castle may be small, but we punch way above our weight and I hope that you will be as proud of this achievement as I am.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas and a wonderful New Year. I also finish by expressing my heartfelt thanks for all that you have done to support the estate throughout 2019.

We had several dogs pass their Kennel Club Good Citizen Scheme Bronze award, and quite a few pass their silver. If you are walking your dog at night, please wear something reflective and put something reflective onto your dog. As a driver it's very difficult to see a dark dog and handler when you have headlights coming towards you. There have been a couple of narrow misses just recently.

Christmas cake, Christmas pudding, sultanas, raisins, currants, grapes, chocolate. 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CHOCOLATE CARAMEL SQUARES INGREDIENTS (SUFFICIENT FOR 8" SQUARE TIN)

<u>BASE</u>

200gms soft margarine 100gms light brown sugar 250 gms plain flour 80gms rolled porridge oats

CARAMEL FILLING

50gms block butter 50gms light brown sugar 397gms tin of FULL FAT CONDENSED MILK (Half fat condensed milk DOES NOT SET!)



150gms chocolate (can be mixture of plain/milk if wished) 25gms white chocolate (optional)

<u>METHOD</u>

Pre-heat oven 180c/160c FAN Grease and line 8" shallow square tin (baking parchment to be above sides of tin, to allow you to lift biscuit out easily, if you do not have a loose bottom tin) Beat together the margarine and light brown sugar in a bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in the flour and the rolled oats. Use fingertips to bring the mixture together, if necessary. Press mixture into the base of the tin. Bake biscuit in oven (centre or just above centre shelf) for approx. 20 minutes (We look after 15 minutes – biscuit should be just golden

brown and firm.

Place ingredients for caramel filling in a heavy base pan and heat GENTLY, Stirring until the sugar has dissolved and ingredients combined.

STIRRING ALL THE TIME, over a low heat, cook very gently for 3-4 minutes approx., until the mixture thickens. This part makes your arm ache! Mixture will suddenly be ready – take off heat and briskly stir. If not going thick, put on heat again. IF YOU DO NOT STIR CONTINUOUSLY, THE SUGAR WILL BURN!)

Pour caramel filling over the cold biscuit base and put in fridge to set.

Melt dark chocolate (or mix of milk and dark). Spread over the caramel mix.

Put in fridge till set. Lift out of tin.

If you wish – melt white chocolate and "spin" over top by quickly shaking melted chocolate off a teaspoon.
